**LOCAL AIR QUALITY STRATEGY** (Key Decision Reference: JUL12(B)/07)

# 1. Summary and reasons for recommendation

- 1.1 In September 2007 the Council approved its first Local Air Quality Strategy to provide the best practicable protection to human health and the environment through effective local air quality management.
- 1.2 The 2007 strategy has now come to an end and the revised strategy builds on this work and outlines how the Council will manage local air quality in Forest Heath and deliver our statutory responsibilities.

#### 2. Recommendation

2.1 Cabinet are recommended to approve the revised Local Air Quality Strategy.

## 3. How will the recommendations help us meet our strategic priorities?

3.1 Delivering the revised strategy seeks to promote our strategic priorities by fulfilling our statutory responsibilities and maintaining good local air quality within Forest Heath. The Council's continued vision to embrace a clean, green and safe Forest Heath is compatible with the strategy's aims and objectives.

## 4. Key Issues

- 4.1 Poor air quality reduces the life expectancy of everyone in the UK by an average of seven to eight months and up to 50,000 people a year die prematurely because of it. The Air Quality Regulations 2000 require all local authorities in the UK to review and assess air quality within their area.
- 4.2 The Council produced its first Local Air Quality Strategy in 2007 which detailed the way in which the Council would fulfil its statutory duties. The strategy contained various actions that were successfully implemented. The revised strategy builds on the successes of the previous strategy and includes further actions that will assist the Council in fulfilling its duties and responsibilities.
- 4.3 The Council is a lead regulator in the management of local air quality and Officers within Environmental Health carry out various activities to fulfil the Council's responsibilities.
- 4.4 Road transport is a major source of air pollution both nationally and locally. Environmental Health work in partnership with other organisations to maintain and monitor the quality of air in the district. Suffolk County Council and the Highways Agency are key partners and work with Officers to maintain air quality within Forest Heath.
- 4.5 Air quality and climate change are fundamentally interrelated. Many common pollutants are 'climate active' and by reducing emissions it will lessen the effects on the climate. A warming climate also threatens to make air quality worse, with the prevalence of harmful photochemical smogs. The most significant air pollutant, within the district is caused by emissions from vehicle exhausts.

#### 5. Other options considered

- 5.1 Even though there is no statutory requirement to produce a Local Air Quality Strategy, it demonstrates how the Council will fulfil its statutory obligations and assists in raising the awareness of an important public health risk.
- 5.2 Other options have been considered, such as producing a West Suffolk air quality management strategy. However, the revision of the 2007 strategy was considered to be the best option due to the time it would take to draft a West Suffolk strategy
- 5.3 The revised Strategy offers an interim solution although it is intended to produce a West Suffolk Strategy in the future.

## 6. Community Impact

- 6.1.1 There are no crime and disorder implications from the proposed air quality strategy.

- 6.3.1 Air quality is interlinked with climate change and sustainability. The revised strategy recognises these relationships and aims to ensure that air pollution remains below nationally prescribed levels.

- 6.4.1 The implementation of the revised strategy will have a positive impact on the community as a whole.
- **7. Consultation** (what consultation has been undertaken, and what were the outcomes?)
- 7.1 The revised strategy has been consulted on with partner organisations. The revised strategy has been received positively by Suffolk County Council and the Suffolk Environmental Protection Group. The Strategy was also reviewed by Overview and Scrutiny Committee at its meeting on 26 July who also requested that a copy of the Strategy be sent to all Members for comment. Details were sent out on the 13 August 2012 and no adverse comments have been received.
- **8. Financial and resource implications** (including asset management implications)
- 8.1 There are resource implications in terms of delivering the strategy's Action Plan. The resources will be provided using existing Environmental Health budgets. The Council's Environmental Protection budget includes the ongoing sum of £3,500 for Air Quality Monitoring and there is an amount of £27,937 provided for as a "one-off" sum in the same budget for Air Quality Management, arising from a previously approved Service Improvement.
