Introduction

In Spring 2011 the Borough Council launched the preparation of new vision documents for Bury St Edmunds, Haverhill and for the rural Area. The consultation took the form of inviting the local community, stakeholders and infrastructure and service providers to identify the key issues that the respective areas faced over the period to 2031 and to ask what their vision for the area in 2031 was. Comments were submitted to the Council either on-line, via postcards, email and normal written correspondence.

This report provides a summary of the comments submitted during the Spring 2011 consultation period and the Council's response to those comments. **Full copies of the submissions can be viewed on the Council's website** The report does not summarise comments submitted to the developers of strategic sites around Bury St Edmunds and Haverhill who undertook site specific consultation exercises and have produced separate consultation reports.

A similar report will be published following future consultation stages of preparing the Vision 2031 documents.

Should be arranged in small groups rather	Many of the comments made have either been incorporated into the draft concept plan for the area, or may be used in the development of a masterplan for the area. However, there are two areas where the concept plan does differ: 1. The concept plan does include a vehicular access to Coupals Road, although it is intended as a tertiary route, rather than a main access. However, the internal road layout should still be designed to accommodate bus routes. 2. The community facilities are not all proposed on the Chalkstone Way frontage as this would be far too remote to serve a large part of the proposed development area. However, it may be appropriate to introduce some form of facility in this general location.
