Rural Action Plan - Update Report

1. Summary

- 1.1 The Council's second Rural Action Plan, which covers the period from March 2008 to February 2011, was approved through Overview and Scrutiny Committee on 5 March 2008.
- 1.2 In addition to regular monitoring by officers throughout the year, it was agreed that the development of the Rural Action Plan would be monitored on an annual basis by the Overview and Scrutiny Committee. As such, the first annual monitoring report for the current Rural Action Plan was taken to that Committee on 22 April 2009.
- 1.3 However, the responsibility for overseeing the development, and monitoring the implementation of the Rural Action Plan, now comes under the remit of the Rural Area Working Party. This report therefore forms the first report on the this Plan to the Rural Area Working Party.

2. Purpose of the Report

2.1 The purpose of the report is:-

To update the Working Party on the progress made from March 2008 to October 2009 towards completion of projects within the Rural Action Plan as indicated in Appendix A attached to this report.

3. Background

- 3.1 The 2008-2011 Rural Action Plan contains 35 projects under the following headings:-
 - (a) projects to create quieter and safer village roads;
 - (b) projects to improve community accessibility;
 - (c) projects to maintain and enhance the quality of the environment; and
 - (d) projects to promote stronger and sustainable rural communities.

3.2 All projects have been given approximate dates by which they should be completed, and the projects are to be delivered across the three years of the plan.

4. Monitoring and review

- 4.1 For the review, projects have been subjected to a 'traffic light' approach, as approved as part of the Rural Action Plan on 5 March 2008. The key is as follows:-
 - (a) **Green** These are completed projects, and a final project summary will be given under the progress report column.
 - (b) Amber These are projects in progress and on track, and a summary of what has been done so far and how near the project is to completion will be given under the progress report column.
 - (c) **Red** These are actions that have not been able to start yet or have encountered a problem, a summary of why they have not been started and how this delay will be resolved will be given under the progress report column.
- 4.2 Projects that are not due to be started yet have not been given a traffic light status, since they are neither completed, in progress, or encountering problems.

5. Next steps

- 5.1 The projects within the Rural Action Plan are subject to different timescales and each project will commence and be completed in sequence.
- 5.2 The next annual review of the plan is due in April 2010.
- 5.3 In Autumn 2010 a review will need to be undertaken to investigate the next steps when the current plan expires in 2011

6. Recommendations

6.1 It is **RECOMMENDED** that the Working Party notes the progress made towards the completion of the Rural Action Plan projects.

The villages taking part have been liaising with BT for phone lines to be installed in their village hall.
