Development of the 2011-2014 Rural Action Plan

SUMMARY

On 2 December 2010 Cabinet agreed to extend the Rural Action Plan for a further three years to cover the period from April 2011 to March 2014 (Report B303 refers). This decision followed the recommendation from the Rural Area Working Party held on 18 November 2010.

The first phase of the consultation process has been completed. This consisted of internal consultation with Members and Officers, and external consultation with our partners and rural residents.

A consultation draft Rural Action Plan has now been prepared using the information received to date. Officers are now seeking approval to send the draft plan out to consultation. The results of this second phase of consultation and the final draft Rural Action Plan will be presented to the Rural Area Working Party for consideration at its meeting on 10 March 2011.

PURPOSE OF THE REPORT

The purpose of the report is:-

- (1) for Members to note the draft Rural Action Plan;
- to seek approval from Members to consult on the consultation draft Rural Action Plan (using delegated authority as approved under Report B303); and
- authorise the Rural Economic Development Officer to make any necessary amendments to the consultation version of the plan prior to circulation.

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Development of the 2011-2014 Rural Action Plan

1. Background

- 1.1 Internal consultation for the new Rural Action Plan took place in November and December 2010 as follows:-
 - (a) Members of the Rural Area Working Party were consulted for their suggestions for suitable project ideas for inclusion in the new Rural Action Plan in terms of resources available and need;
 - (b) all rural members were contacted and asked to suggest project ideas through the 'Member's Bulletin';
 - (c) Officers within various sections of St Edmundsbury Borough Council were consulted for project suggestions; and
 - (d) Borough Council Staff who live in a village in St Edmundsbury were asked to complete the online survey via the staff 'E-Teamwork' bulletin.
- 1.2 External consultation with partners (including Business Link, Mid Anglian Enterprise Agency, Suffolk ACRE, Suffolk Association of Local Councils, Suffolk County Council and West Suffolk College) took place in November and December 2010.
- 1.3 The first phase of external consultation with rural residents took place from 2 December 2010 through a special edition of Rural News (following Cabinet approval of the Rural Area Working Party's recommendations of 18 November 2010).

2. Current position

- 2.1 To date 44 first phase public consultation responses have been received . The questions asked were:-
 - (a) What project/s would you like to see take place in your village?
 - (b) Do you have any spare time? Would you like to do more to support your community? Can you give examples of the support you could offer?
 - (c) Is there anything else that you would like to let us know about?
- 2.2 The closing date for the first phase of consultation was 24 December 2010. An analysis of the responses is attached as Appendix B to this report.

2.3 A draft Rural Action Plan has now been prepared and forms Appendix A of this report. The document reflects responses to the consultation received by 23 December 2010. The Rural Action Plan is a flexible working document (and will continue to be so throughout the three year period from April 2011 to March 2014) and thus as consultation responses continue to be received, the Action Plan project list will be amended as appropriate. The delivery dates for projects are currently quite broad in the majority of instances, but these will be fine-tuned at the first annual review.

3. Next steps

- 3.1 Subject to approval of the consultation draft Rural Action Plan as requested by this report; the second phase of public consultation will commence shortly after the 14 January 2011 and end on 14 February 2011.
- 3.2 The second phase of public consultation will continue to ask members of the public and local organisations for project ideas, but will also ask the public for their opinion on the projects listed in the consultation draft Rural Action Plan.
- 3.3 Consultation responses will be collated and analysed, and further discussions will take place with our delivery partners.
- The final Rural Action Plan will then be presented to the Rural Area Working Party on 10 March 2011 for it to recommend approval by Cabinet on 16 March 2011. The Full Council will be asked to approve the plan in April 2011.
- 3.5 Once the document has been approved, the Rural Action Plan for 2011-2014 can be officially launched at the Spring Parish Conference (date yet to be confirmed).

4. Recommendations

It is **RECOMMENDED** that the Working Party:-

- (1) note the consultation responses received to date;
- (2) approve the draft Rural Action Plan, as amended, for consultation (using the delegated authority as approved following Report B303); and
- (3) authorise the Rural Economic Development Officer to make any necessary amendments to the consultation version of the plan prior to circulation.

Executive summary

This Rural Action Plan is based upon a clear vision for our communities, which remains unchanged from our last Rural Action Plan. This vision is to have:

"Active, sustainable and thriving communities in peaceful and unspoilt countryside".



Whilst our vision remains the same, we realise that the Rural Action Plan itself must be a flexible document that will inevitably evolve over the three years of the plan. St Edmundsbury Borough Council, like all local authorities, is having to work smarter and more efficiently to adapt to the new political and financial landscape. Our partners are also under similar pressures. Therefore some projects within the action plan may need to be reviewed or taken out of the plan, and new projects may need to be added. We always welcome project ideas and funding, so please keep letting us know if you think of projects that we can work on with our partners.

For ease of reading, projects within the action plan have been split into four sections: **empowerment** (enabling communities to help themselves), **environment** (improving both the built and the natural environment), **prosperity** (to generate a healthy economy) and **well-being** (actions which improve the quality of life of individuals and communities). Naturally, some projects fall within more than one of these headings, so we have associated what we consider to be the most appropriate heading to each project.


There are various types of projects in the plan, including those that support training needs, those that support and advise individuals and groups on various issues (including funding, business and older people's well-being), those that facilitate events and others that offer small grants. Small grants are particularly important since they provide money through a swift application process which enables communities to carry out much-needed community-led projects that otherwise may not have taken place.

Some projects listed in the action plan (for example, funding and supporting housing needs surveys, tours of the larger St Edmundsbury villages, and developing the Rural Coffee Caravan Information Project) will be familiar since they have been carried forward from our 2008 to 2011 plan. Experience has shown that these projects work and villages will continue to benefit from them.

This action plan enables St Edmundsbury Borough Council and its partners to be involved in real local projects that make a difference for our rural communities.

Context

This Rural Action Plan has been produced during a time of unprecedented financial and political change in the country. There have been a number of developments in recent months, at local, regional and national levels. Local authorities at district and borough level, for example, are looking to share or merge their services to make savings.



Suffolk County Council has responded with its 'New Strategic Direction' programme, whereby the County Council will provide fewer services directly and many services will be delivered by different organisations in the future, including the voluntary sector, private sector and community groups.

The Government has announced its intention to abolish Regional Development Agencies and support the creation of Local Enterprise Partnerships, which are due to be in place by March 2012. Furthermore, the Prime Minister has launched the 'Big Society' concept, which aims to give more power to local people and communities. Intrinsically linked to this is the Localism Bill, which includes the new 'Community Right to Build'.

All of the above changes mean that there is an increased need for communities to help themselves at a time when grant funding across the country will be diminishing. Nonetheless, these circumstances bring lots of opportunities; local people and community groups can get involved in the future development of their local area to determine its future in a way that has been difficult before.

Despite a reduction in its Government grant, St Edmundsbury Borough Council continues to invest in its rural areas; hence this Rural Action Plan.

Facts and figures

Nationally, 20 percent of the population lives in rural areas. The rural population of St Edmundsbury is therefore above average at 41.5 percent. We have defined 'rural' as everywhere in the borough outside Bury St Edmunds and Haverhill.

Most of our villages have a population of under 1000, eight have populations of 1000 to 2000, and only three have populations of more than 2000 (Great Barton, Ixworth and Stanton) according to the 2001 Census.

The population of St Edmundsbury's rural areas increased by 3.2 percent between 1991 and 2001; this was less than the rate of increase in the towns. Between 2001 and 2008 the population of rural England rose faster than in urban areas, according to The Commission for Rural Communities' *State of the Countryside Report 2010*.

Nationally there are growing differences between the age profiles of rural and urban England. There are more older people living in rural areas and there has been a reduction in the proportion of people aged between 20 and 35 years. This is true of St Edmundsbury's rural population, which experienced a 25 percent decrease in people aged between 16 and 25, and a 50 percent increase in those aged 65 or over between 1991 and 2001.

While virtually all households in urban areas nationally have access to services, a much smaller proportion of those in rural villages have similar access to services. This again is true of our local rural areas, where the number of post offices, shops and public houses is declining. Young people living in rural areas also feel dissatisfied because of the lack of facilities and services for them on their doorstep. There is therefore a dependence upon the main towns that provide employment, schools, shops and health and leisure activities. However, since public transport is not always available, it makes it very difficult for some people, particularly those without their own transport, to access any services. This can lead to rural isolation and thus a reduced quality of life.

Affordability of housing is a key concern within rural St Edmundsbury, with high house prices and rents relative to incomes. Families on lower incomes cannot compete with affluent incomers and so those new to the housing market are forced to move away from where they grew up, leaving family and friends. One in four households in sparsely populated areas have an income of less than 60 percent of the national average, when calculated before housing costs have been taken out.

Among businesses in rural areas, there are more start-up enterprises nationally in villages than towns. Because people in rural areas rely on their own cars, gas emissions per head are 8 percent higher than in urban areas.

Twenty-nine percent of people living in the most rural districts have given unpaid voluntary help at least monthly over the last year, compared with 21 percent of people living in the most urban authorities. In the last decade, there has been a marked increase in the number of people volunteering for conservation projects.
