Rural Action Plan 2011 to 2014

SUMMARY

- On 1 December 2010 Cabinet agreed to extend the Rural Action Plan for a further three years to cover the period from April 2011 to March 2014 (Minute 87(d)(1) refers). This decision followed the recommendation from the Rural Area Working Party meeting held on 18 November 2010.
- 2. The first phase of consultation, asking members of the public for project ideas, was carried out in December 2010. Following an analysis of the responses received, a draft Rural Action Plan was presented to the Rural Area Working Party on 13 January 2011 (Paper B408 refers). At this meeting the draft Rural Action Plan was approved by Members to go out to consultation. The second phase of consultation therefore took place from 14 January to 28 February 2011, and the Working Party agreed that this report would be circulated to follow to allow the maximum opportunity to comment.
- 3. The responses from this phase of consultation have now been analysed and a final Rural Action Plan has been produced and is attached to this report.
- 4. The purpose of this report is to report the findings/results from this consultation phase and to agree the final Rural Action Plan for 2011-2014.

RECOMMENDATIONS

It is **RECOMMENDED** that:-

- (a) the Rural Action Plan for 2011 to 2014, attached as Appendix A to Report B499 be recommended to Cabinet for approval; and
- (b) the Corporate Director for Community Services, in consultation with the Chairman and Vice-Chairman of the Rural Area Working Party be authorised, to make any necessary minor amendments to the final document prior to publication.

Rural Action Plan 2011/2014

1. Background

- 1.1 Public consultation on the draft Rural Action Plan took place from 14 January 2011 to 28 February 2011, promoted via another special edition of *Rural News*.
- 1.2 The online survey asked the following questions:-
 - Question A: For each project in the draft Rural Action Plan, please tick the box according to your preference:
 - Keep the project in the final plan;
 - Remove the project from the final plan; or
 - No preference.
 - Question B: We have tried to include projects that cover a wide variety of issues. Do you think there are areas that we have missed? If so, what project/s would you recommend to fill this gap?
 - Question C: Do you think that the number of projects in the draft Rural Action Plan is:
 - Too many;
 - Too few; or
 - About right.
 - Question D: Lastly, please let us know if you have any further thoughts about the draft Rural Action Plan.

2. Consultation responses

- 2.1 53 responses to the consultation were received, and our thanks go to those who took the time to respond.
- 2.2 The responses to Question A (should the projects be kept or removed) have been analysed and the option that had the most votes can be summarised as follows:

Keep

36 projects identified to be kept in the Plan.

Remove

Two projects were identified to be removed:

- The Rural Coffee Caravan Information Project; and
- Encourage villages to make the most of the 2012 Olympic opportunity.

No preference

Seven projects were voted into the no preference category:

- Promotion and support for the Upper Stour Valley and the Brecks;
- The 'Business Carbon Cutters' Grant;
- A business electricity monitoring Service;
- Provide an 'enterprise champion';
- National Mills Day events;
- Tours of St Edmundsbury villages; and
- Pilot a joint business event or activity in partnership with the Clare Business Association.
- 2.3 The responses received to Question B (additional project suggestions) and Question D (further thoughts) included comments on some specific parts of the Rural Action Plan and these have been reflected in the final document. Other comments were not directly related to the Plan, and those have been forwarded to the relevant services or have been noted.
- 2.4 The responses to Question C (are there too many/few projects) can be summarised as follows:

2.5 Details of the consultation results will be made available in due course on the Borough Council's website.

3. Resulting amendments to the Rural Action Plan

- 3.1 The responses to Question A tell us that a small proportion of projects should be reconsidered. Concurrently, the majority of respondents have said that there are too many projects within the Plan.
- 3.2 Despite 21 people wanting to remove the Rural Coffee Caravan Information Project, all the respondents that voted to remove it were from villages that do not, and have never, received visits from the caravan. It is, therefore, recommended that this project remains within the Plan (particularly since those respondents that do receive visits from the caravan voted to keep the project). The Rural Coffee Caravan Information Project has been running in St Edmundsbury for three years and has supported more than ten villages, who have valued this work. During 2011 to 2014 the Rural Coffee Caravan Information Project intends to widen its coverage.
- 3.3 It is, therefore, recommended that the following amendments are made to the Rural Action Plan, that the:-
 - (a) projects below be merged into one project entitled 'Deliver the Business Carbon Cutters grant and support':

- Deliver the 'Business Carbon Cutters' grant; and
- o Deliver a business electricity monitoring service.
- (b) projects below be merged into one project entitled: 'Advice and support for rural enterprise':
 - o Business support sessions for rural business industrial estates;
 - o Deliver business start-up support to rural areas; and
 - o Provide an 'enterprise champion'.
- (c) projects below be merged into one project entitled: *'Support and promote rural tourism and heritage'*:
 - o Deliver and support Heritage Open Day events;
 - o Deliver National Mills Day events; and
 - o Deliver tours of St Edmundsbury villages.
- (d) projects below be merged into one project entitled: *'Planning guidance on rural redundant buildings'*:
 - o Create a Farm Diversification Guidance booklet; and
 - o Create planning guidance on the re-use of redundant buildings in rural areas.
- (e) projects below be merged into one project entitled: 'Deliver and support rural youth work':
 - o Deliver rural youth work; and
 - Deliver support towards providing rural youth outreach work.
- (f) project below be removed from the plan:
 - o Encourage villages to make the most of the 2012 Olympic opportunity.
- 3.4 The amendments above will result in the total number of projects being reduced from 45 to 37.
- 3.5 The final Rural Action Plan document is attached at Appendix A. This includes all of the projects proposed to be taken forward.

4. Recommendations

- 4.1 It is **RECOMMENDED** that:-
 - (a) the Rural Action Plan for 2011 to 2014, attached as Appendix A to Report B499 be recommended to Cabinet for approval; and
 - (b) the Corporate Director for Community Services, in consultation with the Chairman and Vice-Chairman of the Rural Area Working Party be authorised, to make any necessary minor amendments to the final document prior to publication.

Executive summary

This Rural Action Plan is based upon a clear vision for our communities, which remains unchanged from our last Rural Action Plan. This vision is to have:

"Active, sustainable and thriving communities in peaceful and unspoilt countryside".



Whilst our vision remains the same, we realise that the Rural Action Plan itself must be a flexible document that will inevitably evolve over the three years of the plan. St Edmundsbury Borough Council, like all local authorities, is having to work smarter and more efficiently to adapt to the new political and financial landscape. Our partners are also under similar pressures. Therefore some projects within the action plan may need to be reviewed or taken out of the plan, and new projects may need to be added. We always welcome project ideas and funding, so please keep letting us know if you think of projects that we can work on with our partners.

For ease of reading, projects within the action plan have been split into four sections: **empowerment** (enabling communities to help themselves), **environment** (improving both the built and the natural environment), **prosperity** (to generate a healthy economy) and **well-being** (actions which improve the quality of life of individuals and communities). Naturally, some projects fall within more than one of these headings, so we have associated what we consider to be the most appropriate heading to each project.


There are various types of projects in the plan, including those that support training needs, those that support and advise individuals and groups on various issues (including funding, business and older people's well-being), those that facilitate events and others that offer small grants. Small grants are particularly important since they provide money through a swift application process which enables communities to carry out much-needed community-led projects that otherwise may not have taken place.

Some projects listed in the action plan (for example funding and supporting housing needs surveys and developing the Rural Coffee Caravan Information Project) will be familiar since they have been carried forward from our 2008 to 2011 plan. Experience has shown that these projects work and villages will continue to benefit from them.

This action plan enables St Edmundsbury Borough Council and its partners to be involved in real local projects that make a difference for our rural communities.

Context

This Rural Action Plan has been produced during a time of unprecedented financial and political change in the country. There have been a number of developments in recent months, at local, regional and national levels. Local authorities at district and borough level, for example, are looking to share or merge their services to make savings.



Suffolk County Council has responded with its 'New Strategic Direction',

programme, whereby the County Council will provide fewer services directly and many services will be delivered by different organisations in the future, including the voluntary sector, private sector and community groups.

The Government has announced its intention to abolish Regional Development Agencies and support the creation of Local Enterprise Partnerships, which are due to be in place by March 2012. Furthermore, the Prime Minister has launched the 'Big Society' concept, which aims to give more power to local people and communities. Intrinsically linked to this is the Localism Bill, which includes the new 'Community Right to Build'.

All of the above changes mean that there is an increased need for communities to help themselves at a time when grant funding across the country will be diminishing. Nonetheless, these circumstances bring lots of opportunities; local people and community groups can get involved in the future development of their local area to determine its future in a way that has been difficult before.

Despite a reduction in its Government grant, St Edmundsbury Borough Council continues to invest in its rural areas; hence this Rural Action Plan.

Facts and figures

Nationally, 20 percent of the population lives in rural areas. The rural population of St Edmundsbury is therefore above average at 41.5 percent. We have defined 'rural' as everywhere in the borough outside Bury St Edmunds and Haverhill.

Most of our villages have a population of under 1000, eight have populations of 1000 to 2000, and only three have populations of more than 2000 (Great Barton, Ixworth and Stanton) according to the 2001 Census.

The population of St Edmundsbury's rural areas increased by 3.2 percent between 1991 and 2001; this was less than the rate of increase in the towns. Between 2001 and 2008 the population of rural England rose

faster than in urban areas, according to The Commission for Rural Communities' *State of the Countryside Report 2010*.

Nationally there are growing differences between the age profiles of rural and urban England. There are more older people living in rural areas and there has been a reduction in the proportion of people aged between 20 and 35 years. This is true of St Edmundsbury's rural population, which experienced a 25 percent decrease in people aged between 16 and 25, and a 50 percent increase in those aged 65 or over between 1991 and 2001.

While virtually all households in urban areas nationally have access to services, a much smaller proportion of those in rural villages have similar access to services. This again is true of our local rural areas, where the number of post offices, shops and public houses is declining. Young people living in rural areas also feel dissatisfied because of the lack of facilities and services for them on their doorstep. There is therefore a dependence upon the main towns that provide employment, schools, shops and health and leisure activities. However, since public transport is not always available, it makes it very difficult for some people, particularly those without their own transport, to access any services. This can lead to rural isolation and thus a reduced quality of life.

Affordability of housing is a key concern within rural St Edmundsbury, with high house prices and rents relative to incomes. Families on lower incomes cannot compete with affluent incomers and so those new to the housing market are forced to move away from where they grew up, leaving family and friends. One in four households in sparsely populated areas have an income of less than 60 percent of the national average, when calculated before housing costs have been taken out.

Among businesses in rural areas, there are more start-up enterprises nationally in villages than towns. Because people in rural areas rely on their own cars, gas emissions per head are 8 percent higher than in urban areas.

Twenty-nine percent of people living in the most rural districts have given unpaid voluntary help at least monthly over the last year, compared with 21 percent of people living in the most urban authorities. In the last decade, there has been a marked increase in the number of people volunteering for conservation projects.


