Rural Vision 2031: Issues consultation summary

Summary

- 1. On 13 January 2011, the Rural Area Working Party narrative item on the process for preparing the Rural Vision 2031 document and asked for suggestions for engaging local people in the process (Minute 40 refers).
- The initial public engagement events took place between 3 March and 30 May 2011.
 A wide variety of consultation methods were used that conformed to the Council's adopted Statement of Community Involvement for the preparation of the Local Development Framework (LDF).
- 3. The local community and stakeholders were invited to submit their views on the issues in the rural area and their vision for the future for the rural area.
- 4. A summary of the events which took place during the consultation period is attached for information as Appendix A. Comments received during the consultation period are attached as Appendix B and the Working Party is asked to note comments.
- 5. The Working Party is asked to **NOTE** the comments arising from the consultation.

1. Purpose of Report

1.1 The purpose of this report is to inform the Working Party of the outcomes of the Rural Vision 2031 issues consultation.

2. Background

2.1 The Council prepared a vision document for the whole of St Edmundsbury in 2005 called Vision 2025. It was designed to give a clear and shared vision of "how we see the beautiful and successful area of St Edmundsbury in 20 years' time". It was prepared after talking to a range of partner organisations and the local community to identify the main challenges that needed dealing with by 2025. Vision 2025 now needs looking at again to see what has changed and to extend the period that it covers. Three documents called Bury St Edmunds Vision 2031, Haverhill Vision 2031 and Rural Vision 2031 will do this.

- 2.2 Vision 2031 is a new project to create a community-led shared vision for each part of the Borough for the next 20 years. It considers the whole of each area and what makes it function, as well as what new development will be needed to meet the future needs. This wide ranging exercise will take over a year to complete and covers all the service issues that need to be addressed by 2031. The first step in the process was to consult the community on issues and what their vision is for their area.
- 2.3 On 13 January 2011, the Rural Area Working Party noted the narrative on the process for preparing the Rural Vision 2031 document on 18 January 2011, the Sustainable Development Working Party recommended to the Cabinet that the Issues consultation on Rural Vision 2031 should commence (Sustainable Development Working Party Minute 50 refers). This recommendation was endorsed by Cabinet at its meeting on 19 January 2011 (Cabinet Minute 104 refers) and consultation took place between 3 March and 30 May 2011.
- 2.4 The consultation was undertaken in accordance with the Council's Statement of Community Involvement for the preparation of Local Development Framework documents as adopted by the Council on 26 February 2008 following examination by a government Planning Inspector.

3. Rural Vision 2031 and the Local Development Framework

- 3.1 Between April and June 2010 the Council consulted on the Rural Site Allocations Preferred Options document which set out the Council's preferred development sites in the rural area. Since then a number of changes including the new Government in May 2010, the impending Localism Bill and some changes to National Planning Policy have meant that the process for preparing this document needed to be reviewed.
- 3.2 The comments received in 2010 in relation to the proposed sites in the Rural Site Allocations Preferred document will be reviewed and will form part of the evidence base in the preparation of the Rural Vision 2031 document. As well as allocating sites for development in the rural area it is important to note that the Rural Vision will encompass wider issues to allow a vision for the rural areas to be developed as outlined in paragraph 2.1 above.

4. Issues Consultation Events

- 4.1 Set out below is a summary of the advertising and publicity which has taken place for the Rural Vision 2031 issues consultation:-
 - (a) launch event at Rougham Village Hall on 2 March 2011 which was followed by a number of consultation drop-in events across the rural area (Appendix A refers);
 - (b) dedicated website which contains links to background information and fact sheets by town area and theme;
 - (c) freepost postcards distributed across the rural area, at consultation events and via the dedicated website to allow people to highlight the big issues in the rural area and their vision for their area 2031;

- (d) freepost fact finding questionnaires distributed across the rural area, at consultation events, and via the dedicated website to gather information on how people use and live in the villages and use the two towns;
- (e) LDF Newsletter advertising all consultations sent by email to 1700 people/organisations;
- (f) letter to statutory consultees informing of consultation dates in accordance with the Council's adopted Statement of Community Involvement;
- (g) details of all events given to Parish Councils for distribution in local newsletters/magazines where possible;
- (h) advertising of consultation drop in events in the Members Bulletin (27 January and 11 February);
- theme of the week updates on the St Edmundsbury twitter site to stimulate interest and link through to the Vision 2031 websites;
- (j) advertising of events in local newspapers;
- (k) posters advertising drop in events put in strategic locations around the villages;
- (I) use of external parties websites/Twitter sites to link to the Vision 2031 websites including Homelink, The Theatre Royal and Art Gallery;
- (m) packs of questionnaires, postcards and a poster provided at each Polling Station on election day for display; and
- (n) engagement with County Upper and King Edwards Schools and Horringer Court Middle School (the latter two arranged and still to take place).

5. Consultation results

- Whilst consultation postcards and questionnaires are still being submitted as a result of the publicity on the Election Day, to date a total of 102 freepost postcard responses have been received in relation to the consultation. Six of these were received via the Council's dedicated web-site. A summary of the responses received is attached at Appendix B.
- 5.2 A total of 188 'fact finding' questionnaires have been received in response to the consultation. 153 were received by post and 35 were received online via the website. These will be analysed over the next few weeks and the information used to assist us in the provision of services during the next stage of the Vision 2031 project.

6. Next Steps

Officers are currently working up the draft document for consideration by the Working Party for a period of public consultation in late summer, taking into consideration the comments received in relation to this issues consultation. Officers will make a presentation to the Working Party outlining the process, timeline and the next steps of the project.

7. Recommendations

7.1 The Working Party is requested to **NOTE** the outcomes from the Rural Vision 2031 issues consultation, as detailed in Appendix B to Report C20.

Rural Vision 2031 'Issues' launch event feedback

Rural Vision 2031 'Issues' public consultation feedback

Introduction

St Edmundsbury Borough Council have been consulting people on what they feel the main issues facing Rural areas are over the next 20 years as part of the Rural Vision 2031 exercise. These have been collected in the format of 'postcards' asking for peoples top three issues. In total, 102 postcards have been received to date and the issues raised have been summarised by theme as follows:

The number of people who raised each issue is indicated in brackets after each sentence and issues have been ordered from most common to least common.

Homes and Communities

- There is a fear of over-development or large/inappropriate development and a need for careful planning to avoid this (15)
- Need for more affordable housing for young people or those on low incomes (10)
- Poor village community and community cohesion/involvement (3)
- Residents of villages close to Haverhill are worried about coalescence with the town and losing the rural character of their village (3)
- There is a need to finalise housing need and completed the proposed new homes (2)
- People do not wish for further homes to be built in their villages (2)
- High cost of housing (1)

Jobs and Economy

- Problem of local unemployment (2)
- Pressure on community volunteers to take over services (1)
- Poor economy (1)

Travel

- Too much road traffic which is noisy and damages the roads and flooding of roads (23)
- Lack of public transport especially at evenings/weekends (23)
- There are too many big/heavy lorries using village roads (12)
- There is a lack of sufficient buses, particularly at evenings and weekends, and ticket prices are too high (7)
- Need more footpaths (5)
- Poor condition of pavements (2)
- Need safe access for wheelchairs- scootermobility (1)
- Need better links to London (1)
- There is a growing need for a bypass (round Great Barton) (1)

Sustainability and Climate Change

- Dislike wind turbines/wind farms (6)
- The sustainability of an aging population (4)

Crime and Community Safety

- Speeding cars/motorbikes/lorries (17)
- Lack of policing and crime prevention (3)
- Need more street lighting (2)
- Issue of vandalism and anti-social behaviour particularly by youths (2)

Infrastructure and Services

Risk of closure of local shops and post offices and need to expand local shops (18)

- There is insufficient provision of parking at local shops and schools (6)
- Threat of closure of local village amenities/services/facilities (6)
- Need better maintenance of public spaces to deal with dog fouling/litter/trees and hedges (4)
- Ageing sewage infrastructure (2)
- Need for cultural facilities (1)
- Need better drainage provision (1)
- Need better child facilities (1)

Leisure and Recreation

- Need more facilities/activities for young people and teenagers (15)
- Need for more playgrounds and recreational/amenity areas (5)
- Need good community pub (4) although pubs are noisy (1)
- Need more sports facilities (3)
- Need more museums (1)

Health

• Lack of/poor GP service (2)

Education & Skills

- Need to maintain library (1)
- Fear over loss of schools due to school reorganisation (1)
- Need homes to support schools (1)
- Need pre-school facilities (1)
- Need to expand schools (1)

Historic and Natural Environment

- Wish to maintain rural character and village identity (6)
- Development/accessibility of public open space (3)
- Risk of closure of country park (2)
- Need to preserve and develop agricultural land for wildlife (1)
