43. Substitutes

There were no substitutes at the meeting.

44. Apologies for Absence

Apologies for absence were received from Councillors David Bimson, Christine Mason, Reg Silvester and Lance Stanbury.

45. Minutes

The minutes of the meetings held on 10 September 2015 and 15 October 2015 were accepted by the Committee and signed by the Chairman.

46. **Public Participation**

There were no questions/statements from members of the public.

47. Presentation by the Cabinet Member for Operations

As set out in the Council's Constitution, at every ordinary Overview and Scrutiny meeting at least one Cabinet Member would be invited to attend to give an account of his or her portfolio and answer questions from the Committee. Therefore, to carry out this constitutional requirement, members were asked to consider the responsibilities of the Cabinet Member for Operations, who had been invited to the meeting.

Report No: OAS/FH/15/013, set out the overall responsibilities of the Cabinet Member for Operations, which were:

Car parking

- CCTV
- Cemeteries
- Fleet management
- Ground maintenance
- Land drainage
- Markets (delivery)
- Operations
- Property services and estate management
- Public conveniences
- Refuse/recycling
- Street scene
- Tourism (operations)

Councillor David Bowman, Cabinet Member for Operations opened his presentation by thanking the Committee for the invitation. The presentation set out the areas of responsibility; structure; key facts; and current major projects. There were three broad services areas with split Portfolio responsibility for the West Suffolk service with Forest Heath District Council:

- Waste and street scene (Cllr David Bowman and Cllr Stevens)
- Property services (Cllr David Bowman and Cllr Stevens)
- Leisure, cultural services (Cllr Andy Drummond and Cllr Jo Rayner)

A breakdown of operational costs was provided for waste and property only, and total operations including leisure for Forest Heath; St Edmundsbury and West Suffolk.

A number of statistics and major projects covering waste and property services were included, such as for West Suffolk:

- 5.7 million bins emptied each year containing 64,000 tonnes of material;
- Maintaining a fleet of 200 vehicles covering 1 million miles each year;
- West Suffolk Operational Hub
- Bartec (back office system and in-cab technology)
- Owning 410 varied property assets;
- CCTV control room dealt with over 1,600 incidents each year (mostly unreported) and new CCTV control room
- Mildenhall Hub
- Car parking reviews

Members discussed the presentation in detail and asked a number of questions of the Cabinet Member and the Head of Operations, to which comprehensive responses were provided.

In particular discussions were held on the following:

- (1) Bartec Members were advised that the Bartec in-cab technology would help in the management of the brown bins. It would show who had subscribed to the service and generate bills etc.
- (2) Car Parking Strategy Members were advised that a new Car Parking Strategy was progressing and would be presented to Cabinet in due

course. The Strategy would include capacity; how to manage existing car parks and a number of options for Newmarket, such as signage; free overnight parking and utilising spare capacity in pocket car parks.

- (3) CCTV Officers were looking into the ability of having mobile CCTV cameras which could be deployed at special events such as the Christmas Market.
- (4) Depot Road, Newmarket Open Door who managed the site had closed the recycling centre due to rising disposal costs and declining recyclate income. The charity was no longer able to operate in the current format. Officers advised that Suffolk County Council were in discussions with the charity to seek a way for the household waste site to be reopened.
- (5) Income generation Officers were looking into various opportunities to generate income, such as providing major cleansing operations using heavy equipment.

The Chairman thanked the Cabinet Member for Operations for his informative presentation.

There being no decision required, the Committee **noted** the presentation.

48. Directed Surveillance Authorised Applications (Quarter 2)

The Regulation of Investigatory Powers (Directed Surveillance and Covert Human Intelligence Sources) Order 2010 required that Members should scrutinise the authority's use of its surveillance powers on a quarterly basis.

What would you like to suggest for investigation / review?

To investigate the integration of local public transport serving Forest Heath residents.

I recommend that a hearing be convened by the Overview & Scrutiny Committee of Forest Heath District Council into the integrated public transportation serving our communities, to enable the council to form a view on their efficiency, their integration, their promotion and to what extent they contribute to the economic development of the district.

It is clear, from examining bus and train timetables, from discussion with Abellio Greater Anglia, and the failure of the DfT Rail Executive to include this council's concerns expressed in its consultation on the franchising process, that there is a lack of integration or consideration of the needs of the local community.

Such a hearing should therefore invite, and take evidence from, rail and bus operators and the county council transport department, to allow the committee to make recommendation to Cabinet on how it might influence the improvement in the integration of local public transport.

What are the main issues / concerns to be considered?

There is a lack of public transport integration because;

- Local communities are poorly served by public transport
- There appears to be a lack of user data available to support scheduling
- The companies do not appear to be communicating well with each other,
- Bus and train timetables are not synchronised well,
- Train and bus services are infrequent and sporadic, and fail to support commuters
- Economic development is hindered by poor commuter services
- Franchise agreements appear not to take account of local consultation.

Would this review benefit from a "West Suffolk" approach (i.e. joint scrutiny by both Councils), or is it relevant only to your council?

This issue is relevant to all areas, as there are many railway stations and copious bus services in West Suffolk, however a wider scrutiny process could easily become huge, infinite and unwieldy. I would therefore recommend limiting this enquiry to this district first to enable a short examination and quick recommendations and to highlight points for wider consideration.

Who is responsible for providing this service, or tackling the issue in question?

See Bus and train operators listed under 'witnesses' below.

The Rail Executive oversees the rail franchising schedule.

Have you spoken to them, and if so, what was the response?

I have discussed services with Abellio Greater Anglia and my report is attached (Appendix 2A)

What is the Portfolio Holders view on this issue?

The portfolio holder for economic development appreciates the current issues with local transport and has written jointly to the rail franchising department.

What would be the likely benefits and outcomes of carrying out this investigation / review?

The O&S committee can make recommendation to Cabinet on how to encourage bus and train companies to work more closely together to improve their services to our constituents.

Estimated Committee and officer resource implications (eg research group, oneoff report, dedicated meeting etc)

The first requirement is for officers to prepare a summary of the current services, the operating companies, consultation process and identify gaps in services.

The next requirement is on the committee is to take verbal evidence from the public transport companies. This may require two or three sessions. For those companies unwilling to appear officers should try to obtain written answers to the committee's questions.

Officers to produce a summary with suggested recommendations for the committee's final deliberations and recommendations to Cabinet.

Lack of Integrated Transport

1. Executive Summary

As a new member for Red Lodge I recently carried out a survey of my constituents to ascertain their views on local services. The results are shown below in graphic form. One of the greatest causes of concern of local residents is the state of local public transport (39%) and as an occasional rail commuter to London myself I have personal experience of the infrequent train services from Kennett and the lack of integration with other forms of transport, such as buses, as well as the deficiency of passenger facilities. A number of Red Lodge residents speak of the difficulty of using public transport...

"Public transport: There is currently no viable public transport option for evenings out in Bury St Edmunds and Cambridge. The Kennett train on runs every 2 hours! Why? So I can't commute to Cambridge."

"Public Transport: I feel as I get older I will have to rely on public transport more. More regular trains and buses please"

"When I return from London, if I miss the 17.44 from Kings Cross I have a two hour wait for the Kennett train. We need better local services."

"The buses are horrendous. We only have one car and trying to get the baby to baby groups in Mildenhall and especially Newmarket & Cambridge is impossible. And no buses at all in the evenings and Sundays? Terrible."

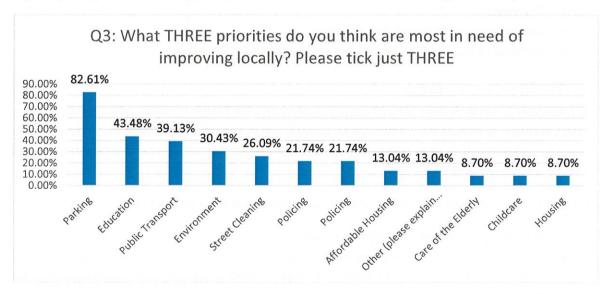


Figure 1: Survey of Red Lodge Residents. Summer 2015. Sample 248

I therefore arranged a meeting with Abellio Greater Anglia to bring to their attention the concerns of local residents, to understand their transportation strategy and to explore whether they could adjust their timetabling and train frequencies to better service existing, and attract new, customers.

During the meeting (details of which are given below) I secured agreement of Abellio to attend a scrutiny session at Forest Heath Council to explain their strategy and how they are addressing passenger concerns over their services. I was also clear that such a hearing would benefit from attendance by all those companies who contribute to the integrated transportation that serves the residents of Forest Heath.

2. Recommendation

I recommend that a hearing be convened by the Overview & Scrutiny Committee of Forest Heath District Council into the integrated public transportation serving our communities, to enable the council to form a view on their efficiency, their integration, their promotion and to what extent they contribute to the economic development of the district. Such a hearing should invite, and take evidence from, rail and bus operators and the county council transport department, to allow the committee to make recommendation to council on how it might influence the improvement in the integration of local public transport.

It is hoped that the council might act as a convener, on behalf of its citizens, between transportation companies, to encourage their working together.

4. Abellio Great Anglia

In December I met with their head of customer services, Neil Grabham, along with Alan Neville and James Stewart, to discuss the Cambridge to Ipswich line in general and services to Newmarket and particularly Kennett (the local railway station for Red Lodge). The company welcomed this meeting and the discussions proved fruitful.

I sought the meeting to look into the following concerns about services to Kennett.

- Frequency of services mostly two hourly
- Times of services e.g. morning departures at 07:04, 07:43 and then 10:07 affecting badly connections to London at Cambridge. Also poor evening services from Cambridge at 17:44, 18:44 and then 20:44 and two-hourly thereafter!
- Station facilities at Kennett including shelters, ticket machines, electronic information boards, car parking and bus stops.
- Number of carriages and their cleanliness

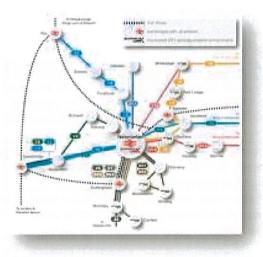
On the Cambridge to Ipswich line we touched on;

- Track modifications
- Electrification
- Speed
- Gratitude was shown for the recently improved carriages and stations.

5. Example: Bus Services Serving Red Lodge and Kennett Railway Station

There is only one bus service through Red Lodge that takes potential commuters to Kennett railway station. The timetable comparisons below demonstrate the total lack of integration of public transport. For example, if one wishes to commute from Red Lodge to Cambridge (and perhaps thence to London) there are no buses servicing the first two morning trains at 0600 and 0704. (If one needed arrive in central London for before 9am it would not be possible as one would need to take the 0704 in order to connect with the 0743 to London Kings Cross, which arrives at 0840. The 0743 from Kennett is too late).

Worse is found if one wishes to commute from Red Lodge to Bury St Edmunds via Kennett as the buses arrive on average 10 minutes after the train has departed, otherwise one would need to wait at the train station for almost two hours.

The undoubted consequence of this disconnection in public transport integration is;

- Greater car use and increased carbon emissions
- Potential discouragement of commuting to Cambridge/Bury reducing income levels and the economic activity in the community, with potential effect on benefits and health
- Lower use of public transport reducing potential profits and requiring higher public subsidy
- Lower levels of public mobility with discriminatory potential
